Coping With Hunger: Food Pantry Clients In The Central Missouri Food Bank Region



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Background

The emergency food system in the United States is a critical component of food security, which the Food Assistance and Nutrition Research Program within the United States Department of Agriculture defines as "access by all people at all times to enough food for an active, healthy life." Food insecurity in this country is normally due to insufficient resources for food purchases, and the majority of food insecure households avoid hunger by relying on a more narrow range of foods or acquiring food through private and public assistance programs. The USDA reported that more than 13.5 million households, or nearly 38 million Americans, were food insecure in 2004. Further, 3.9 million households, comprising nearly 8 million citizens, were categorized as "food insecure with hunger," meaning one or more household members were hungry sometime during the year because they could not acquire enough food.

Food insecurity in Missouri affects 261,000 households, including 197,000 children. In the more severe case of food insecurity with hunger, state levels have been increasing and now impact more than 90,000 households and 66,000 children. Missouri is one of seventeen states with a rising percentage of food insecurity with hunger and its increase over the first few years of this decade is among the highest five in the country.

The costs of food insecurity are economic, social, physical, and psychological. For example, the economic costs of food insecurity among adults include income loss, work

absenteeism, higher demand for public benefits and social services, and increased rates of health care and social welfare expenditures. Food insecurity and poverty are clearly correlated and symbiotic—poverty is the best single predictor of food insecurity and hunger is strongly correlated with lower educational achievement, unemployment, and impaired work performance. Recent studies of children show food insecurity and hunger are significant predictors of chronic illness, low birth weight, lower school performance, and developmental problems among children.

Services provided by food banks and food pantries are the cornerstones of the private sector's response to food insecurity. Regional food banks collect food and a range of diverse resources from individuals, businesses, government agencies and other sources for distribution to the more numerous community-based pantries. Pantries are the point of contact with clients, who receive food from the pantries for off-site preparation and consumption. (This report does not address facilities and programs that prepare meals for on-site consumption, such as emergency kitchens and senior centers.) Missouri is served by six regional food banks, which in 2004 distributed more than 61 million pounds of food to pantries throughout the state.

The Central Missouri Food Bank (CMFB), located in Columbia, distributed more than 18 million tons of food in 2004, the second highest total in the state, to more than 120 food pantries, emergency kitchens, shelters, daycare and senior centers, and other facilities in 31 counties in the central and northeast sectors of the state. The food bank's distribution poundage has increased more than 50 percent since 2000.

The goal of this project was to conduct a systematic survey of food pantry clients to assist the CMFB in its effort to continue to provide the best possible services to regional residents. Comprehensive and reliable knowledge of pantry clients and their households is essential to the pragmatics of food assistance, including what changes (if any) need to be made in when, where or how assistance is provided, and what might be done to meet the needs of at-risk and vulnerable constituencies. Data on food pantry users may also point to which groups may be under-utilizing these facilities and the need for new programs to address their needs. Finally, it is evident that as much as many Missourians support the work of food banks and pantries, the scope and depth of food insecurity and hunger often remain unknown and unrecognized in the very communities in which these institutions operate. It is our hope that this survey portrait of clients will not only confirm the important work of the CMFB and the pantries it serves, but also raise societal awareness of food insecurity and the need for each of us to contribute what we can to its amelioration.

Survey development and implementation

MU researchers developed the food pantry client survey in the Spring of 2005. The instrument (see Appendix 1) includes major sections on food pantry use, food security, food acquisition sources, health and nutrition, and general individual and household demographics. The questions reflect a diversity of sources and goals, including questions identified by the CMFB as important to their missions and included in a 1998 survey conducted by the agency, the food security module developed by the USDA and used in

many studies, health and nutrition questions from surveys developed by the Center for Disease Control, and additional questions reflective of the research and program needs of both MU researchers and the CMFB. MU researchers pretested a survey draft at pantries in Callaway County and Boone County in April, 2005, after which MU and CMFB personnel met to finalize the final survey content. Both English and Spanish versions of the survey were prepared and printed.

The MU team hired six students (Silvia Christen, Allison Howard, Leticia Mayberry, Rebecca McGill, Ann Nothwehr, and Jana Thies) to work as interviewers. In addition, two Nutrition Education Assistants (Annette Craig and Monica Haaf) employed by University of Missouri Extension were "loaned" to the project for the month of June. The student and Extension interviewers each received a day of training on implementing the survey and completed practice interviews before entering the field. MU researchers monitored interviewer progress through review of completed surveys, occasional joint trips to pantries, and regularly scheduled meetings. Interviewing began on May 16 and was completed by August 6.


Sampling

The Central Missouri Food Bank serves nearly 70 locations distributing food for off-site preparation and consumption, and in addition operates a mobile pantry that makes monthly visits to sites in the region. The goal of our sampling was to target levels of completed surveys at each pantry based on the proportion of each site's monthly number of clients as a percentage of the region's total service. For example, if a pantry served 5% of the regional total our goal was to complete 5% of our surveys at that facility.

To determine appropriate target goals, the CMFB provided access to pantry-reported numbers of clients served for the period of May-August, 2004. We chose these months because pantry client numbers fluctuate over the course of a year and we opted to match our baseline numbers with the same months during which we planned our survey. The average monthly total of clients served over the period was more than 51,000 individuals. We then compiled a listing that averaged each pantry's percentage of the total over these four months.

Before determining target numbers, however, we pared our list by removing any pantry servicing an average of less than 0.5% of the regional total. We based this decision on the lack of statistical necessity of arranging visits to pantries that would have contributed very few surveys, as well as the logistical challenges of completing the project in a timely fashion. This decision removed nearly 20 pantries from our list, but these facilities together served less than 7% of the total food pantry client population. The final schedule included 51 pantry facilities and 11 mobile pantry locations that together serviced more than 93% of food pantry clients in the summer of 2004. During the course of administering the survey, four pantries were removed from the sample because they either no longer existed at their current sites or experienced too little volume to properly administer the survey. Survey numbers specified by the initial design were reallocated to nearby pantries to ensure the

integrity of the sample. The statistics in this report include results from 47 pantry facilities and 11 mobile pantry locations.



Study Area

We determined target numbers of interviews at each remaining location by taking its percentage of clients served and multiplying it by our initial target goal of 1200 surveys. Thus a pantry that served 5% of the region's total would have received a target of 60 surveys (5% of 1200). We chose a target goal of 1,200 to provide a confidence level of 95% and a confidence interval of +/- 3% across the entire region. These confidence levels and intervals hold for the report of the total region, but we caution readers that the subgroup statistics in

the report tables have variable, and usually lower, confidence levels due to the smaller numbers in reported groups.

We completed a total of 1,314 surveys. The total is close to 10% higher than our target due to two major reasons. First, interviewers were instructed to oversample at any location by up to 10% if the collection context allowed. The project condoned oversampling due to our expectation that a small number of surveys being incomplete or unusable to missing data. Second, interviewers oversampled by more than 10% at pantries in Cole and Pettis Counties. As noted below in the section on "data weighting," in these latter cases we have weighted the data to bring the numbers to the original target levels. The total number of surveys for each pantry that are reflected in this report can be found in Appendix 2.

Pantries varied greatly in the number of days and hours that they were open, with some pantries open only once a month and others open six days a week. Interview dates and times were scheduled based on when pantries were open, taking into consideration other factors such as interviewer schedules and driving time. For pantries that were open several days each week, interviewer visits were scheduled according to several criteria, including pantry manager indications of the days of the week or month favored by various constituencies and our desire to sample pantry clients at a range of dates and times representative of each pantry's operations.

The overall completion rate for the interviewing was 75.1%, an especially good rate considering the "surprise" nature of the work in which prospective interviewees had no notice of the project and were contacted only as they arrived at a pantry site. An additional 2.8% of contacts agreed to participate, but their interviews were terminated before completion, almost always because the client received notice that their food was ready and chose to end the session. The refusal rate across the project was 22.1%.

Interviewers listed reasons given for lack of interest in participation and also compiled data on the sex and age of refusals, and whether or not these individuals had arrived at the pantry site with children. In comparing the demographic data of refusals with the information from participants, we do not believe there is any significant bias in the research results based on these characteristics. Male refusals constitute 21% of non-participants while males comprise about 23% of cooperating individuals. In terms of age, comparisons between percentages of refusals and participants for three general age groups (18-39, 40-59, and 60+) are, respectively, 36.4, 45.1, and 18.4 for refusals versus 37.9, 42.1, and 20.0 for participants. As for concern that pantry clients with children might be non-participants in greater numbers, 13.2% of refusals arrived at pantries with children while nearly one-third of all participants are from households with at least one child under the age of 10.

Interviewers used a similar protocol at each pantry site. In brief, the protocol called for soliciting participation from every third person coming into, or arriving at, the pantry. To begin work, interviewers contacted this person. If refused, the interviewer contacted the next person (and so on) until a client agreed to be interviewed. At the completion of a survey, the interviewer began again with the third person arriving as the next possible participant.

Data Weighting

The survey results presented in this report contain unweighted returns for all locations except for the four pantries located in Cole County and the Open Door Pantry in Pettis County. In these five cases, interviewers completed more than 110% of the target number of surveys. Due to our desire to avoid any bias as a consequence of this oversampling, the surveys collected in each of these locations were weighted back to the original target number for each location. This method allowed us to use all collected surveys, but kept each pantry's totals within the targeted populations based on proportion of total regional clients served. On all of the following pages, all reports of the number of surveys and the results include the weighted returns for these five pantries.

Reading the Data Tables

The tables in this report present the descriptive results of the "CMFB Food Pantry Survey." The data tables are presented in order of the sequence of questions on the survey instrument, a sample of which is included as a Appendix 1 to this report. The number in the title of each table (e.g., Table "1") refers to the number of the question on the survey form. Table titles with a number followed by another number or letter (e.g., Table 13_A) refer to the specific inquiry within a question that includes multiple sub-questions. In this example, Question 13 asked respondents how often they depended on various public programs to obtain food; Question 13A specifically addresses use of "Food Stamps." The title for each table also includes the question itself, or a summary restatement of it.

Data tables are included for almost all questions in the survey. Six survey questions—Questions 27, 28, 30, 38, 40 and 44—are not included in this report as the data (e.g., present zip code or zip code of previous residence) does not contribute any useful data without reference to other aspects of an individual return. In addition, a few tables at the end of the report include data compiled on the basis of several questions included in the survey. These include total number of individuals per household, food security status, household income as a percentage of poverty level, and body mass index. These variables are discussed in more detail below.

Reading the Tables: INDEPENDENT VARIABLES

The first row of each table (<u>Total</u>) presents the overall total response from all surveys. The total number of surveys is 1,211.

The second row (<u>Mobile Pantry</u>) includes all respondents interviewed while using the mobile food pantry of the Central Missouri Food Bank at stops in Audrain, Boone, Lewis, Macon, Marion, Moniteau,, Osage, Putnam, and Randolph Counties. Our sample includes 111 mobile pantry users, comprising 9.2% of the total.

Following the first two rows, the left-hand column of each table contains the independent variables, against which all survey question results are reported. These variables allow the reader to compare the responses of various subpopulations in the region, categorized by sex,

age, income level, and a number of other variables. Nine independent variables are presented for each survey question. Descriptions of how these variables were derived are found below.

<u>Sex</u> – Interviewers' report of male or female. Our sample includes 930 females (76.7%) and 282 males (23.3%).

<u>Age</u> – Respondents' report of age. For purposes of subgroup analysis, respondents were analyzed in three age categories: 1) "18 thru 39" years of age, including 458 respondents comprising 37.9% of the total; 2) "40 thru 59" years of age, including 509 respondents comprising 42.2% of the total; and, 3) "60 and older," including 241 respondents comprising 20.0% of the total.

Race – Respondents' report of race. Respondents identified themselves as "White," "Black," "Asian," "American Indian," or "Other." This analysis reports on individuals who self-identified as "White," including 976 individuals comprising 80.9% of the total, and "Black," including 131 respondents comprising 10.9% of the total. The numbers of respondents in the remaining categories were each too statistically small to report here with sufficient levels of confidence.

<u>Children in the Home</u> – The survey included questions on the number of children and the number of adults in each participating client household. For this variable, we subdivided respondents into three groups: 1) Households including at least one child and no more than one adult, labeled as "Yes (with 1 adult)" in the table, and including 172 households comprising 14.2% of the total; 2) Households including at least one child and more than one adult, labeled as "Yes (with 2 or more adults)" in the table and including 486 households comprising 40.1% of the total; and, 3) Households including no children, labeled as "No children" in the table, and including 554 households and comprising 45.7% of the total.

Household Employment Status – Based on survey responses concerning hours of paid employment on the part of each adult household member, respondents were subdivided into three groups: 1) Households with no working adults, labeled as "No working adults," including 654 households and comprising 54.5% of the total; 2) Households with at least one adult working more than 34 hours per week, labeled as "Working adult, >34 hours," including 424 households and comprising 35.1% of the total; and, 3) Households with an employed adult, but working less than 35 hours per week, labeled as "Working Adult, <35 hours," including 127 households comprising 10.5% of the total.

<u>Income Level</u> – Based on survey responses concerning average household monthly income from all sources (including salaries and wages, disability, pensions, child support, TANF, Social security) and household size, annual incomes were compared with the poverty guidelines for 2005 developed by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. This federal poverty measure was chosen because it is used to determine financial eligibility for most relevant federal programs (e.g. Food Stamps). The four groups listed on each table are as follows: 1) Household incomes at "0-50% of poverty level," including 289 households and comprising 25.4% of the total; 2) Household incomes at 51-100% of poverty level,"

including 572 households comprising 50.3% of the total; 3) household incomes at "101-130% of poverty level," including 187 households comprising 16.4% of the total; and, 4) Household incomes at "131% and above" of the poverty level, including 89 households comprising 7.8% of the total.

Food Security Level – This survey included the standard 6-item indicator set for classifying households by food-security-status level developed by the United States Department of Agriculture (see, Gary Bickel et al, *Guide to Measuring Household Food Security, Revised 2000*, Washington: USDA Food and Nutrition Service, 2000). The six items can be found as Tables 6, 7, 8, 8A, 9, and 10 in this report. Following the USDA guidelines, respondents were divided into the following three sub-groups: 1) "Food Secure" includes respondents who answered in the affirmative for 0-1 of these six questions, including 302 households comprising 25.2% of the total; 2) "Food insecure, w/out hunger" includes respondents who answered in the affirmative for 2-4 of these six questions, including 477 households comprising 39.8% of the total, and 3) "food insecure, with hunger" includes respondents who answered in the affirmative for 5-6 of these 6 questions, including 420 households comprising 35.0% of the total.

Metro Status – Respondents were divided into three groups based upon the metropolitan status of the county in which their household resided. A county's metropolitan status is defined by the US Office of Management and Budget using decennial census data and is based primarily on the population size of the county and secondarily on commuting patterns which link more rural counties to urban counties. These groups are as follows: 1) "Rural" counties with a population under 10,000 persons, including 287 households comprising 24.7% of the total; 2) "Micropolitan" counties either contain a population between 10,000 and 49,999 persons or 25% of its workforce commute to a county with a population between 10,000 and 49,000, including 467 households comprising 40.2% of the total; and, 3) "Metropolitan" counties either contain a population of 50,000 or more or 25% of its workforce commute to a county with a population of 50,000 or more, including 408 households comprising 35.1% of the total.

Region – Respondents were divided into groups based on their county of residence. The following geographic regions are used: 1) Boone County, 2) Cole County, 3) Morgan and Miller Counties, 4) Pettis County, 5) "Northwest region," including Putnam, Schuyler, Sullivan, Adair, Linn and Macon Counties, 6) "Northeast region," including Scotland, Clark, Lewis, Knox, Marion, Shelby, Monroe and Ralls Counties, 7) "Southwest region," including Chariton, Randolph, Saline, Howard, Cooper, and Moniteau Counties, and 8) "Southeast region," including Audrain, Callaway, Montgomery, Osage, Maries, and Phelps Counties.

The tables at the end of the report include four variables that combine more than a single survey question and are presented in this report for general information. Data is given for each of these variables across all subgroups. "Food Security Level" is described above. "Household size" shows the total number of adults and children in each household by subgroup. "Ratio of income level to poverty threshold" is the variable described above as "Income Level." The final table, "BMI," present subgroup data for the body mass index, which is a health status indicator used in the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System of

the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Individual BMI is calculated as weight in pounds divided by height in inches squared times 703. Individual BMIs are characterized by the CDC as underweight (below 18.5), normal (18.5 - 24.9), overweight (25.0 - 29.9), and obese (30.0 an above).

Finally, unless otherwise indicated, all of the data returns are given as percentages. Within any specific group or subgroup, and for each question, the total across each row should equal 100 percent of returns for that group and question.
